

## This year's picks What to see at Salone

NEW PIECES / ITALY

Supersalone and this year's Milan Design Week will be defined by elegant Italian designs. We've highlighted some key releases debuting over the next week that are not to be missed.

In its pared-back form, this year more of the emphasis at Supersalone, and across the broader Milan Design Week, will be on Italy's domestic design enterprises But those venturing here from further afield will not be anticipating a downgrade in terms of quality Neither, of course, will the Italian guests, who will expect a design spectacle to rival the Saloni of

years' past.

Judging from the sneak previews of releases that some renowned design companies have allowed MONOCLE to see, excellence will not be compromised this September.

From marble masterpieces to reissues of magnificent mid-century designs and the perfect bar stool, the selection shows that the the selection shows that the world's top designers and makers have certainly been keeping themselves busy since the last Salone del Mobile in April 2019. For your enjoyment, MONOCLE has highlighted the standout releases

set to launch at the event. Many of these are from Italy itself, while others hail from distant shores – but every one is trying to make a big impression on the design industry this year. Here are 15 of our new favourite pieces.

CASSINA Soriana armchair Italy

Earlier this year Cassina reissued this armchair first designed by Afra and Tobia Scarpa in 1969. It comes in a selection of fabrics and leathers with a metal brace.

Designed in the mid-century by Danish duo Fabricius and Kastholm, this foldable lounge chair, which is being reissued for Saione del Mobile, has a solid oak structure and linen canvas seating. carthansen.com

the monolithic structures that are found throughout the Balearic islands Inspired by the monoitine structures that are found infoughout the balearic islands, Spanish architect Patricia Urquiola designed this collection of elegant dining and coffee tables that make the most of Salvatori's array of natural stone materials.





KRISTALIA

This smart modular outdoor sofa Inis smart modular outdoor sofa was designed by London's Industrial Facility for furniture firm Kristalia. The versatile teak platform supports the padded elements and can double as a side table.



Notable for its high, pebble-cushioned Notable for its high, pebble-cushioned backrest, this new sculprural armchair is the work of celebrated Japanese industria designer Naoto Fukasawa. It can also be purchased with a matching ottoman that serves as a footstool or side table.

The highlight of many Milan Design Weeks in years past has been the opportunity for visitors to get behind the doors of some of the city's most beautiful private buildings. Many of the best showcases at Fuorisalone, the component of the event where the city of Milan becomes something of a giant exhibition site, take place in grand palazzos, which are typically closed to outsiders for the rest of the year. During Milan Design Week creative companies get the unique chance to reinterpret these historic settings through daring installations and exhibitions. Inspired by this idea, MONOCLE

has teamed up with Swiss appliance maker V-Zug to provide visitors to Salone with a rare opportunity to discover the city's Teatro Gerolamo over two nights of talks and

festivities. Despite being a stone's festivities. Despite being a stone's throw from central Milan's Duomo, this architectural gem - a cosy 209-seat theatre, originally constructed in 1868 – remains relatively unknown outside the city. This is partly due to the fact that the building has only been recently restored; it was brought back to its former glory in 2017, having been closed since 1083

Resurrected as a private initiative of Italy's Ceschina Healthcare Company, its use since its masterful restoration has been limited due to the pandemic. However, this Milanese treasure will shine in front of a design-focused audience when MONOCLE and V-Zug take to the stage for a very special event during Salone. Asking the question "Where are we heading?", two separate discussions will take place

on 7 and 8 September, both looking at how the built environment will evolve as we come out of this recent

difficult period.

After the world was forced to pause during the pandemic and people were able to reflect on how they wanted to live, exciting and innovative changes are now afoot in the design industry. All of this and what it means will be unpacked in a relaxed environment, hosted by MONOCLE editors in conversation with leading designers, hospitality players and members from the V-Zug international team. These en promise to be unmissable highlights of Milan Design Week.
